The Lord's Recovery in Canada

Brother Watchman Nee Visits Vancouver



In August/September 1933, Brother Nee visited Vancouver, Canada.

This was the last place he visited before returning by steamship to Shanghai on September 8, 1933.

Br. Watchman Nee Visits Vancouver

In Vancouver, Brother Nee attended and spoke at an exclusive Brethren conference held during the Labour Day weekend from September 1 to 3, 1933. Brother Nee spoke concerning "Jesus, the Friend of Sinners" and some in the audience received salvation. The meetings were held at the Brethren Gospel Hall located at East 8th Avenue and Ontario Street. This building still exists today and is only one city block away from Hall 2 of the church in Vancouver.

In early 1975, two Vancouver brothers visited an elderly Brethren brother who had attended the meetings in which Brother Nee had spoken. He said of Brother Nee: "No one has ever suffered more through tongue or pen than that brother."

Beginnings and Spreads of the Lord's Recovery in Canada

The Lord's Recovery in Canada grew mostly from its beginnings in both Vancouver and Toronto. Various other localities in Canada had a few saints who came directly from the Far East, often as students. Their increases came mostly from migrations from either Vancouver or Toronto, gaining of new saints locally, and later with immigration from the Far East and other places.

Brother Lee frequently held conferences in both Vancouver and Toronto, providing a solid basis upon the pure revelation of the Scriptures as accurately taught by both Brothers Watchman Nee and Witness Lee. As a result the churches enjoyed a steady increase in numbers.

Vancouver

Meetings in Vancouver began in 1965 in the homes of two brothers who came from the church in Hong Kong. By the late 1960s there were approximately 50 saints meeting in an upstairs room on 823 East Hastings Street. Most of these saints were from Hong Kong. Brother Lee visited the church in Vancouver at least five times prior to 1973.

In 1973, a group of saints migrated from Toronto to join the saints who were already meeting in Vancouver. The meetings were moved to a rented office on 433 West Broadway.

From 1973 to 1975 the Lord marvelously added to the church many local people from different parts of the province through the riches of Brother Lee's ministry.

Brother Lee visited the church in Vancouver again in November 1978. By 1983 the church had outgrown the rented facilities and purchased a meeting hall at 2255 Quebec St. Brother Lee visited once more in March 1988.

Vancouver

During the 1980s, members of the church in Vancouver migrated to **Calgary**, **Edmonton** and **Winnipeg** to strengthen the Lord's testimony in those localities. Saints also began meeting as the churches in **Burnaby** and **Surrey** when some members moved there from Vancouver. With continuing increase, an expansion to the hall at 2255 Quebec St was needed; it was completed in 1989.

In 1998, the church purchased a second meeting hall at 105 East 50th Avenue while retaining its existing hall at 2255 Quebec Street (or 77 East 7th Avenue). In the same year, church members living in the neighbouring city of Richmond were formally established as the church in Richmond.

The church in Vancouver, meeting on the ground of oneness, continues steadfastly in the teaching and fellowship of the apostles as did the early church in the New Testament (Acts 2:42) and enjoys the rich blessing of the New Testament ministry that gave birth to it.

Toronto

Toronto began with a family moving from Taiwan to Waterloo, Ontario in December 1965. This family learned that a couple in the Lord's Recovery was moving from Germany to Toronto and initiated contact with them. Shortly thereafter, another couple and their relatives moved from Hong Kong. Gradually other overseas Chinese students from Hong Kong arrived and joined the meetings. By 1967, local saints were also added.

Brother Lee visited the church in Toronto and held conferences in May 1968, June 1969, June 1970, June 1971, and the spring of 1972. In 1969 some young people attended a conference with Brother Lee in Erie, Pennsylvania and were greatly enlivened. In 1971, a group of saints moved to Toronto from a free group in Baden, Ontario. This happened after a sister from a Mennonite free group heard about the meetings in Elden Hall, Los Angeles and attended. Another sister from that same free group went to "rescue" her and eventually she herself was caught and others followed. The church in Los Angeles had prayed fervently for these Mennonites in 1970 and 1971.

Toronto

The Lord's Table was established in Toronto in the summer of 1968. In the fall of 1970 meetings were held in a rented facility in Willowdale, Ontario. In 1971 a property was leased for meeting in downtown Toronto close to the University of Toronto. During those years there were migrations to other cities in Canada including Vancouver, London, and St. Catherines. In 1975 a property was purchased in North York at 671 Sheppard Ave. E and construction began on the meeting hall. Brother Lee again held a conference in Toronto in 1978.

In 1987 a third meeting was introduced in Scarborough, Ontario and later a property was purchased on Meadowvale Road. (In 2004, this property was sold and another property was purchased at 7 Gretna Ave. property). In 1993, having outgrown the downtown Toronto property, the saints there moved to 24 Cecil St. When all these municipalities became amalgamated as the City of Toronto, the North York hall became Hall 1, the downtown Toronto hall became Hall 2 and the Scarborough hall became Hall 3.

Saints living in Coquitlam, Port Coquitlam and Port Moody met in the Church in Vancouver, Church in Burnaby and the Church in Surrey. There were some home meetings and saints who had the burden for a church to be raised up in the Tri-Cities began to pray.

During the turmoil in 1992, Brother Lee had the foresight to encourage the leading brothers in Vancouver to reserve the names of the church for the cities in the Lower Mainland, including the Church in Coquitlam.







Saints in the Tri-Cities came together to pray and participate in the training for GTCA Coquitlam.

Saints in the Lower Mainland, local full timers and FTTA trainees came to strengthen the saints in the Tri-Cities to pass out gospel tracts in the neighborhood and visit the saints in the homes. Bible seminars were given at Douglas College Coquitlam Campus.









Saints in the Tri-Cities began to have the first Lord's table meeting as a district of the church in Burnaby in Kyle Centre, Port Moody.

Leading brothers and saints from the Lower Mainland churches came weekly to supply, support and strengthen the Lord's day meeting over a period of 6 months.



Bibles for Canada

Bibles for Canada (BfC) was inaugurated in **June 2006** with a distribution in the Markham and Kitchener/Waterloo areas of Ontario in conjunction with a Bibles for America tour.

A second distribution took place in July in Edmonton, Alberta. The saints in both areas were greatly rejuvenated by their participation in these events. The church in Calgary has taken on the responsibility for the administration of BfC and the distribution of Bibles.


In the year 2019, over **5,800** New Testament Recovery Versions and ministry books have been distributed through distributions in localities and online orders from the BfC website.

Summer School of Truth

Since 1994, the churches in Western Canada have participated corporately in the one week long Summer School of Truth held in Vancouver, BC. By 2002, the Summer School of Truth was held at Trinity Western University, a campus facility an hour's drive from Vancouver. This afforded a wonderful environment where the young people could participate in the Summer School of Truth with no distractions.

At the same time, the young people from churches in the Northwest United States and their serving ones also attended. Today, the Summer School of Truth is a joint effort among a number of churches in both Canada and the United States. There is untold benefit for the young people of different churches blending together in a spiritual atmosphere. Also, this blends the serving ones from many different localities in one coordination and affords an excellent opportunity for their perfecting.

In August 2019, a total of 291 saints were gathered together, representing 15 localities in Canada and 9 localities outside of Canada. Of these 291, 75 were serving ones and 216 were young people.

Campus Work

The start of the apprenticeship program in Austin, Texas afforded an excellent opportunity for FTTA graduates to join the campus team and learn to serve the Lord on a full time basis. In April 2001, 30 leading brothers and serving ones from Greater Vancouver visited the church in Austin to fellowship concerning the campus work.


In the fall of 2003, with all the churches in Western Canada in one accord, the first team of 10 brothers and sisters from the Vancouver area attended the campus apprenticeship program in Austin. The team returned to Vancouver in December of that year to begin the campus work, concentrating on the largest campus in western Canada, the University of British Columbia (with 61,000 students). The team also serves at another strategic campus, Simon Fraser University (with 35,000 students). The churches are beginning to reap the benefit of the labour on the campuses.


Today, there are:

- 12 full-time serving ones in the campus team in the Greater Vancouver Area.
- 6 full-time serving ones in the campus team in the Greater Toronto Area.
- 3 full-time serving ones in the campus team in Montreal.

Full-Time Training in Anaheim (FTTA)

We are beginning to see the "pipeline" continuing from children, to young people, to college and all the way to the FTTA. Trainees are being built up in the growth in life, being equipped in the realization of the divine truths, and being cultivated in their spiritual capacity to beget, nourish, perfect, and build up the Body of Christ. The number of trainees attending the Full-Time Training in Anaheim has been steadily increasing.




